1 Overseas Christian Military Attaché Invitation Event

On Thursday, May 15, the 2025 Overseas Christian Military Attaché Invitation Event was held at the Defense Convention Room in South Korea. Four Christian military attachés currently serving abroad—in Japan (Colonel), NATO (Colonel), Lebanon (Lieutenant Colonel), and Uganda (Lieutenant Colonel)—participated in the event. It was a meaningful time of sharing field ministry experiences and fostering mutual fellowship.

From MSO, five representatives attended, including the Chairman, ECA Vice President, Director of the World Mission Bureau, Mission Director, and Operations Director. They introduced the work of MSO and discussed potential avenues for future collaboration.

This gathering was an opportunity to encourage the ministries of the overseas Christian military attachés, deepen their understanding of MSO, and foster stronger cooperation for greater impact in their mission fields..

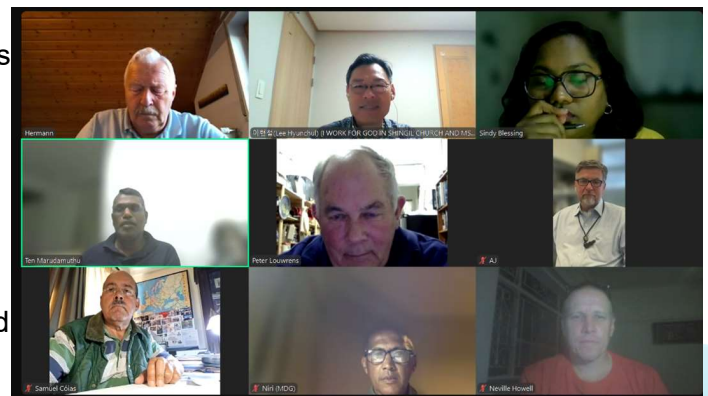
MSO plans to continue building relationships with Christian military personnel serving overseas and actively support effective military missions in each country through ongoing collaboration.



2 Preparatory Meeting Held for 2025 MMTI in Mauritius

On Saturday, May 23, an online meeting was held to prepare for the upcoming Mauritius Mountain Top Interaction (MMTI), scheduled to take place in 2025 in Mauritius. The meeting was attended by nine participants, including Colonel Helman from MMI, Elder Lee Hyun-Chul, Mr. Ten, President of Mauritius MCF, former South Africa MCF Vice President Peter Lawrence, ACCTS representative AJ, and Vice President Niriiniana Ramasitera.

The meeting opened with a time of prayer, focusing especially on asking for God's wisdom in the planning and preparations led by the Mauritius organizing committee. Prayers were offered for the active participation of 14 Southern African nations, and for God to provide the necessary funding and sponsorships to bring the event to fruition..



During the discussion, participants reviewed the overall event plan and administrative readiness. They addressed key logistical aspects such as material preparation, promotion strategies, invitation and registration processes, and budget planning.

MMTI is a significant gathering for military ministry leaders across the African continent to share gospel strategies and receive training. This preparatory meeting laid a strong foundation for the successful execution of the event.

3 Elder Kwon Young-Hae (MSO Advisory Partner) Visits MSO Office

On Saturday, May 18, Elder Kwon Young-Hae—former Minister of National Defense and an MSO advisory partner—visited the MSO office for a meaningful meeting with key leaders. Present at the meeting were Elders Lee Pil-sup, Yoon Yea-il, and Kang Han-kyu, along with the ECA Vice President, Director of the World Mission Bureau, Mission Director, and Operations Director. Together, they engaged in in-depth discussions on ways to strengthen cooperation in MSO ministries and develop international mission strategies.



Elder Kwon emphasized the strategic national and missional significance of regions such as Timor-Leste and Mongolia. He underscored the need for focused prayer and active collaboration in military missions in these areas.

In response, MSO committed to prayerfully assess the state of military missions in these regions and to create a sustainable framework for ongoing cooperation, grounded in God's guidance..

This visit went beyond a courtesy meeting—it served as a valuable opportunity to reflect on and prepare for the future direction of global military missions.

4 The Vitality of Missions Emerging from the Margins in Chiang Mai, Thailand

Missionary Oh Young-Chul (an MSO partner missionary), who serves the Karen people in Chiang Mai, Thailand, and extends his support to Karen communities across the border in Myanmar, recently shared a unique mission experience.

At the beginning of his report, he referenced Dr. Paul Pierson of Fuller Theological Seminary and his "theory of the margins." This theory suggests that rather than from denominational centers or influential leaders, revival and the expansion of missions often begin with the weak and marginalized on the periphery.

On May 4, Missionary Oh and his team visited Sisopu Church, located in the northwestern region of Thailand. They attended a commissioning service for foreign missionaries. The church, a typical rural congregation, is currently constructing its own building despite challenging conditions. Remarkably, the church donated 4,000 baht to support a foreign missionary and warmly urged, "Please come again," expressing their desire to share in the mission vision.

Missionary Oh shared, 'If Dr. Paul Pierson had visited this church, he would have rejoiced, seeing the embodiment of his 'margins' theory in action.' He conveyed deep inspiration from the vibrant life of missions springing up from the outskirts.



5 KVMCF/KMCF Joint Breakfast Worship Service

On Wednesday, May 7, a Joint breakfast worship service hosted by KVMCF and KMCF was held at the main sanctuary of the Central Military Chapel. Approximately 150 attendees—including members of the Ministry of National Defense, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, MCF members in the Seoul area, KVMCF, and MSO officials—gathered to worship together through the Word, prayer, and praise.

The message was delivered by Rev. Kim Tae-Young, Pastor Emeritus of Baekyangro Church, under the title "With God's Help We Can Scale a Wall." He encouraged the attendees to boldly move forward, trusting in God's power and striving for the evangelization of the military. Navy Colonel Oh Soon-Geun led the representative prayer, lifting up heartfelt petitions for military missions.

After the service, participants shared a breakfast and a fellowship meeting, strengthening communication and cooperation, and reaffirming their commitment to fulfilling God's will in their respective positions.

This worship service was a precious time of fellowship, strengthening the unity among MCFs and deepening our shared commitment to military missions in Christ..

We sincerely ask for your continued prayers:

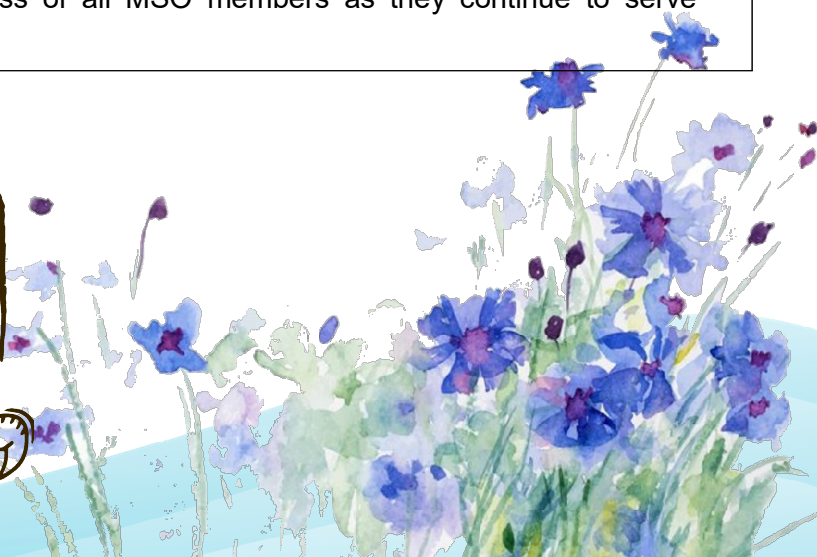
- That Military Christian Fellowships (MCFs) may be planted in the 42 countries where they do not yet exist.
