1 East Asia MCF Presidents' Vision Prayer Meeting in September

The East-Central Asia MCF held an online "Vision Prayer Meeting" on Tuesday, September 9. The meeting was attended by the East-Central Asia (ECA) Regional Vice President (VP), three Central Asia MCF Presidents (Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan), MSO missionary Thomas Kang, Pastor Kim Sang-cheal, East-Central Asia Team Leader Elder Ahn Dae-hee, and ACCTS' Lee Gable — a total of eight participants.

The attendees shared recent activities and prayer requests from the Central Asian MCFs and joined together in intercessory prayer. In addition, the East-Central Asia Regional Vice President presented plans for the 2025 East-Central Asia Interaction and the 2026 East-Central Asia Regional Conference, casting a vision for the future. In particular, discussions were held regarding the possibility of hosting the 2026 "Stand-Dart Conference," with Uzbekistan being considered as the potential host nation. Missionary Thomas Kang agreed to visit Uzbekistan to assess the local situation, after which a final decision will be made through further discussions.

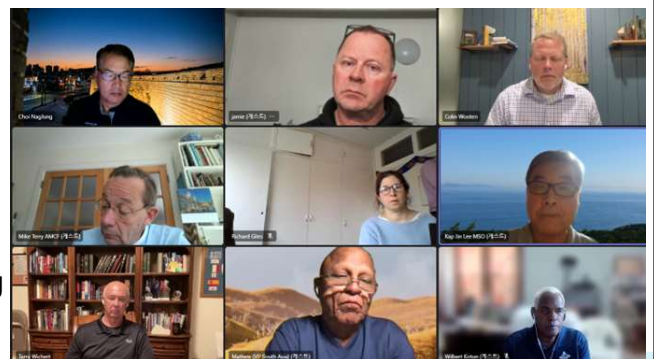
This prayer meeting became a meaningful time for East-Central Asia MCF leaders to gather, share mission strategies, and seek God's guidance together.



2 AMCF Watch & Pray Meeting Held

The AMCF Watch & Pray Meeting was held on the afternoon of September 11, with a total of 12 participants. From MSO, Senior Advisor Elder Lee Kap-jin, East-Central Asia Regional Vice President Chung Bong-dae, and Mission Director Choi Nag-jung took part.

The meeting began with greetings from the AMCF President and proceeded in the following order: △3 Principal Supporting Organizations (3 PSO) updates △AMCF current issues △reports from Vice Presidents. During the MSO presentation, the Mission Director shared MSO updates and plans for the 2026 AMCF Leaders Interaction, followed by Elder Lee Kap-jin's discussion on matters related to the Southeast Asia Regional Vice President.



Participants expressed highly positive feedback regarding the AMCF Leadership Interaction and gave thanks for the support provided for vice presidents' airfare. They also expressed hope that MSO would continue to take the lead in this process.

As for the way forward, discussions were held on △presenting a draft agenda △preparing and distributing a timeline △holding 3–4 online meetings.

3 AMCF Ministry Activities

a. Francophone Africa MCF Prayer Meeting Held

The Francophone Africa MCF held an online prayer meeting on September 10. Participating countries included Benin, Burkina Faso, Guinea, Cameroon, the Democratic Republic of Congo, and Mali. The meeting was led by General Charles Sezan, the Francophone Africa Regional Vice President.

MSO's East Francophone Africa Team Leader, Yoon Moon-soo, and missionary Yim Mal-hee also joined the

gathering, spending time in prayer and fellowship for the military mission work in Africa.

During the meeting, participants shared updates on the military ministry in each Francophone African country and exchanged prayer requests for the spread of the Gospel and the raising of leaders. In particular, earnest prayers were lifted up that, despite the difficult circumstances on the ground, the faith of soldiers would remain steadfast and that each national MCF would grow independently.



b. UK MMI Middle East Regional Prayer Meeting Held

The UK MMI Middle East Regional Prayer Meeting was held on the evening of September 9. Missionary Paul Ko joined the gathering at the invitation of Richard,

the MMI Middle East Team Leader. A total of six UK Middle East team members attended, spending time in discussion and prayer concerning the upcoming military mission program in Egypt this fall. The team tentatively confirmed the Egypt schedule for

November 23–30 and reported plans to organize a military mission camp for young men preparing for enlistment, as well as active-duty youth, from Pastor Mario's church who had previously participated in the Military Evangelism Observation Program (MEO-P). In addition, they shared their intention to invite pastors from major evangelical churches in Egypt for a meeting, and to explore ways to expand the ministry starting with this camp. Despite the challenging environment in the Middle East, participants expressed their hope that this military mission effort would become a spark that reveals the glory of God's kingdom.



4 Visit to the MSO Office

a. Chaplain Na Sung-han (Ministry of National Defense) Visits MSO

Chaplain Na Sung-han from the Ministry of National Defense visited the MSO office on September 11, spending time in fellowship and cooperation. Earlier, from September 1–6, he had traveled to Australia with the Chief of Chaplains, where they engaged with the Ministry of Defence, service headquarters chaplaincies, the Pacific Regional Vice President, and the Australia MCF. This meeting served as a meaningful opportunity to further international cooperation and network expansion for Korea's military mission.



b. Mongolian Pastors Visit MSO

Seven Mongolian pastors visited MSO on September 22 for a time of fellowship. This meeting took place following the Mongolian Pastors' Leadership Conference held in Korea, reflecting growing interest in military missions. It was also facilitated through the guidance and interpretation of Pastor Eul-ji and the relationships built during MSO Chairman Lee Jun's visit to Mongolia.



The gathering included Mongolian pastors, the East-Central Asia Regional Vice President, and the MSO Operations Director, featuring an introduction to MSO, and exchanges on mission-related interests. It served as an opportunity to explore the potential for expanding military missions across the Asian region.

c. Chongkyo Church Military Mission Team Leader Visit MSO

On the afternoon of September 30, Noh Jung-soo, Military Mission Team Leader of Chongkyo Church, visited MSO. Present at the meeting were MSO Chairman Park Nam-pil, East-Central Asia Regional Vice President Chung Bong-dae, and the MSO Operations Director, who together discussed ways to strengthen cooperation in military missions. The program began with an introduction to



MSO, followed by building consensus on global military missions and sharing information on mission work in Uganda. Participants expressed deep interest in the importance of evangelizing the military, as well as in the Military Evangelism Observation Program (MEO-P), the Foreign Military Fellowship in Korea (FMF-K) Interaction, and the current state of military missions in Uganda.

In particular, MSO presented Chongkyo Church with a petition and briefing materials aimed at strengthening cooperation in military missions, and both sides agreed to seek concrete avenues for partnership moving forward. This meeting is expected to further strengthen collaboration between local churches and the global military mission network.

5 MSO Cooperative Missionaries' Ministry Activities

a. News from Missionary Kim Kyung-wan in Brazil

Missionary Kim Kyung-wan in Brazil shared words of thanksgiving as her ministry continues to open up. Recently, she secured an office space of about 10 pyeong (approximately 33 square meters), where she holds counseling sessions and small group gatherings, and a small community now meets there every Sunday. Once a month, she distributes relief goods to serve the local community, while also giving special lectures at seminaries and visiting churches. He requested prayer that the mission center may spread the fragrance of Christ and that healthy partnership and collaboration may continue to flourish.

b. News from Missionary Oh Young-chul in Thailand

The second phase of the Karen Pastors' Training, held from August 18–30, was attended by 52 participants. This training focused on supporting seminary students' commitment to short-term missions in southern Thailand and carried special significance as the first mission sending toward Buddhist and Islamic regions.

To cover the students' expenses, church leaders prayed and requested offerings. Within just a few days, a total of 76,000 baht (approximately USD 2,400) was raised, fully covering all costs. Notably, pastors personally collected and entrusted the offerings to the missionary, marking a turning point in which the local church assumed an active role in missions. This became a tangible example of a missionary culture where one act of commitment inspires further dedication.



6 KVMCF/KMCF Joint Breakfast Worship Service

On Wednesday, September 3, at 5:30 a.m., the KVMCF/KMCF Joint Breakfast Worship was held at the Central Military Chapel. Approximately 150 participants attended, including members from the Ministry of National Defense, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, MCF believers from the Seoul metropolitan area, Korea Veteran Military Christian Fellowship (KVMCF) and MSO representatives, and church members, enjoying a meaningful time of fellowship.

The sermon was delivered by Pastor Noh Myung-heon of Wirye Changgok Church. Under the theme “Two Kinds of Faith,” he shared a message of grace emphasizing the spiritual identity and balance of soldiers and believers. Following the worship service, participants engaged in fellowship and discussions with related organizations, strengthening ties for collaborative ministry.



7 77th Armed Forces Day National Devotion Worship

In celebration of the 77th Armed Forces Day, a National Devotion Worship was held on September 28. in the Central Military Chapel. The service was organized by the Korea Veteran Military Christian Fellowship (KVMCF) and provided a meaningful time of prayer for the nation, its people, and the members of the armed forces.

The sermon was delivered by Pastor Park Heung-jae, senior pastor of the Central Military Chapel, based on Ezekiel 37, under the theme “A Very Great Army.” Pastor Park emphasized the identity and mission of God’s army, saying, “Just as God breathed life into dry bones in Israel and raised them into a great army, we pray that our soldiers may also stand firm in faith and be used as instruments of God for the nation and the world.”

This worship service, marking the 77th anniversary of the Armed Forces, was an occasion to give glory to God and reaffirm the mission of soldiers dedicated to their country and church. Participants also spent time praying for the evangelization of the military, national security, and the growth and revival of KVMCF and KMCF.

- ① May many partner organizations and MSO members attend the AMCF World Day of Prayer (Saturday, October 25, Central Military Chapel) so that they can pray for AMCF and each national MCF.
- ② Grant all members spiritual and physical strength to faithfully fulfill the responsibilities entrusted to them.
- ③ Through the support of churches, partner organizations, and members, may all financial needs for the ministry be fully met without lack.
